## LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

During my 20 years as a full time employee at the Peace Research Institute, Oslo (PRIO) from 1995 to 2015 I have had several leadership positions. Most importantly, as Deputy Director (2009 – 2015) where I was involved in all administrative issues involved in running an institute with up to 100 employees. I served as acting Director when the Director was away and was involved in all aspects of leadership. In addition, I had full and independent responsibility for PRIO’s project development as well as education portfolios had been delegated to me. This means that I have substantial knowledge and experience with cross – disciplinary project development and application writing for national and international funding calls. I also have substantial experience in developing courses and curricula for cross-disciplinary courses. Further, in 2013/2014 I was Research Director for the *Dimensions of Security (DoS)* department (until March 2014 in an intermediary situation), which is one of PRIO’s three current research departments. From 2008-2009, I was Program Leader for the *Ethics, Norms and Identities (ENI)* department which was one of four PRIO's research departments at the time. I therefore have solid management experience and am accustomed to working in, and leading, a multidisciplinary research community in times of both stability and reorganization. I have learned much about personnel management, research management and policy, as well as economic routines for both budgeting and reporting. I have experience dealing with all administrative sides of research project management.

Since I became a full time employee at the Department of Psychology at UiO in 2015, I have also become part of the leader group at the *Center for Research on Extremism (C-REX)* and more specifically responsible for the thematic pillar on prevention measures along with C-REX director Tore Bjørgo. This entails attending regular meetings with the leader group, organize seminars, follow up MA students from various disciplines who are engaged in different themes linked to extremism (I organize an MA seminar with Deputy Director Anders Jupskås every semester) and develop research proposals. I also supervise a PhD student, Hanna Palgaard Munden, who conducts her PhD research at C-REX as a scholar at the Department of Psychology. In addition I am part of another leader group at UiO under the UiO:Norden project entitled *Nordic Branding* where I am responsible for the social science pillar and gender equality politics in particular. This also entails participating in leader meetings, organizing workshops, supervise a postdoc scholar, Sigrun Marie Moss at the Department of Psychology who will conduct research on gender equality norms in Nordic diplomacy, as well as follow up two affiliated fellows (Ann Towns, Associate Professor in political science at the University of Gothenburg and Torunn Lise Tryggestad, Director of the Center on Gender, Peace and Security at the Peace Research Institute, Oslo (PRIO)). Finally, I am also a member of the *Social Science Faculty Board* at UiO (2016 – 2019) and the *program committee* for the interdisciplinary BA level program called *Kultur og*

*Kommunikasjon (KULKOM)* representing the Psychology Department in this collaboration at UiO.

## **PROJECT DEVELOPMENT**

I have both led and developed many research projects over the years. In addition, as mentioned above, one of my main responsibilities as Deputy Director at PRIO was to lead PRIO’s Project Development Team (PDT) which consists of advisors and department managers. I lead this group from 2009 – 2015 and in this capacity I have co-organized, quality assured, and in other ways contributed to numerous applications every year. Amongst the social science institutes in Norway PRIO has one of the highest success rates with EU and Norwegian Research Council funding. I have been part of this success. Further, a rough estimate would suggest that I have contributed to the development of 10-15 projects where I take part either as leader or researcher while at PRIO. I have always had good funding for my research and while at PRIO I was one of the most the well-funded researchers, which is an important asset in a research environment which relies on external funding. At the University of Oslo I have contributed to 5 large project proposals since 2015. Two were funded; one from the Norwegian Research Council funding (SAMRISK) for the establishment of C-REX and the other was the *Nordic Branding* project which was funded by UiO. Three projects (one for H2020, one for Svenska Vetenskapsrådet and one for a Center of Excellence) were not funded. I have solid experience, and several successes, in developing and securing competitive funding. My two FRIPRO projects are cases in point (se lists of ongoing and past projects outlined above).

I have also been invited to the Department of Criminology and Sociology of Law at UiO as well as to the Norwegian School of Theology to give talks on how to do successful project development (in 2017).

## **CONTRIBUTION TO ACADEMIC COMMUNITITES**

As Deputy Director at PRIO I was responsible for PRIO's education portfolio. One of the most important achievements I have made in this respect was the establishment of a Research School in Peace and Conflict Studies at the PhD level (PRIO Research School in Peace and Conflict <http://www.prio.no/Research-School/>) in collaboration with the social science faculties at the University of Oslo and the Norwegian University of Science and Technology (NTNU). The Research School was launched in April 2011 and my responsibility was to lead the steering committee of the school, ensuring daily operations, planning future courses, and expanding to several international partners. In 2013 the research school was awarded 8 years (4 + 4 years) funding from the Norwegian Research Council under my supervision. A general manager was appointed, and I joined the Board of the Research School along with a representative from the University of Oslo and NTNU.

Since 2013 I have been part of the steering group for the *Missing Peace Conferences* in collaboration with Human Rights Center (HRC), University of California, Berkeley, United States Institute of Peace (USIP) and Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) and Women In International Security (WIIS). We have organized conference where the aim is to bridge academia with policy communities on sexual violence crimes in war. We have organized conferences in Washington (2013) at USIP with over 200 participants, in Uganda (2015) with about 100 participants and in December 2017 we will organize a conference in Oslo with 50 participants in collaboration with the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the British Embassy in Norway. In addition to these large conferences we established a Young Scholar Network (YSN) which have met every year since 2013 with a group of 20 PhD and early career scholar writing on sexual violence crimes in armed conflict settings. Our last meeting was in California 10 – 12 July 2017, where I participated and helped organize the meeting.

I am a member of the International Studies Association (ISA) which organizes annual research conferences. I have attended and presented work at these conferences since 1998.

I am also a member of the Gender, Peace and Security, (GPS) Network which is a Norwegian network of scholars who focus on the Women, Peace and Security agenda and who meet twice a year.

Having worked in a multidisciplinary research environment such as PRIO for the major part of my academic career, I have extensive experience in communicating research and insights to colleagues from other disciplines (political scientists, historians, philosophers, religious historians, geographers, sociologists and anthropologists).
